5. ORDINANCE, FIRST READING

5.A Ordinance No. 2018-32, amending Chapter 2, “Administration,” Article IV “Boards and Commissions” of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Kerrville, Texas, by adding a new Section 2-91, to create a Senior Services Advisory Committee; providing the functions of said committee; containing a cumulative clause; containing a savings and severability clause; and providing other matters relating to this subject.

Mr. Baroody moved to approve Ordinance No. 2018-32, with the following amendments: The terms will be staggered, with half expiring in 2019 and the other half expiring in 2020; and the Chair and Vice Chair will be appointed by the members of the committee

after the first appointments by the Mayor. Ms. Eychner seconded, and the motion passed 5-0.

Leavell Survey No. 1862, Abstract No. 1435, into the corporate limits of the City of Kerrville, Texas; said tract being located within Kerr County, Texas, and the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City of Kerrville, Texas; and addressed as 884 Farm to Market Road 783 (Harper Road); further describing the property to be annexed; adopting a service plan for the property annexed; and establishing the zoning for the property annexed.

Sayder Survey No. 142, Abstract No. 290, into the corporate limits of the City of Kerrville, Texas; said tract being located within Kerr County, Texas, and the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City of Kerrville, Texas; and addressed as 1515 Knapp Road S.; further describing the property to be annexed; adopting a service plan for the property annexed; and establishing the zoning for the property annexed.

Ordinance No. 2018-28 amending the City's "Zoning Code" by changing the Zoning District for an approximate 0.28 acre tract of land; said tract being part of a 7.964 acre tract, generally located in the 300 block of Holdsworth Drive, north of the intersection of Holdsworth Drive and Norfolk Lane, and within the City of Kerrville, Kerr County, Texas; by removing the area from a Residential Cluster District (RC) and placing it within the 24-N Zoning District; containing a cumulative clause; containing a savings and severability clause; providing for a maximum penalty or fine of Two Thousand Dollars (2000.00); ordering publication; and providing other matters relating to the subject.

Cage Survey No. 116, Abstract No. 106, within the City of Kerrville, Kerr County, Texas; said property consists of part of the City Hall site, located at 701 Main Street (SH27); authorizing the City Manager to take other reasonable and necessary action, if any, to convey the property, repealing all conflicting ordinances, providing for severability and declaring an effective date.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

Public hearing, consideration, and action to recommend a resolution to allow a Conditional Use Permit for an Electric Facility (Solar Facility) on approximately 4.465 acres of land out of the Samuel Wallace Survey No. 114, Abstract No. 348 in the City of Kerrville, Kerr County, Texas, and generally located in the 2000 block of Singing Wind Drive. (File No. 2018-068)

The proposed KPUB Solar 2 – Schreiner University Solar Energy Project will be a ground mounted solar project equipped with a single-axis tracking system including string inverters, transformers and other ancillary equipment. The schedule in-service date is 2019. The expected operational lifetime of the project is over 25 years.

The conditional use permit is being sought is in accordance with Article 11-I-13(d), Conditional Uses Permitted in Any Zone with a Conditional Use Permit, (2) Electric power plants, transmission and distribution substations and electric facilities.

Consistency with the Kerrville 2050 Comprehensive Plan: The request is consistent with the Kerrville 2050 Comprehensive Plan. The development of a solar facility in particular is consistent with Guiding Principle E6, “*Support access to the infrastructure necessary to accommodate the future growth of housing and business (e.g., water, wastewater, power, communications, roads).*” Additionally, energy is one of the target industries identified in the plan. The subject property is located within Strategic Catalyst Area 9 characterized by Schreiner University and its surrounding area.

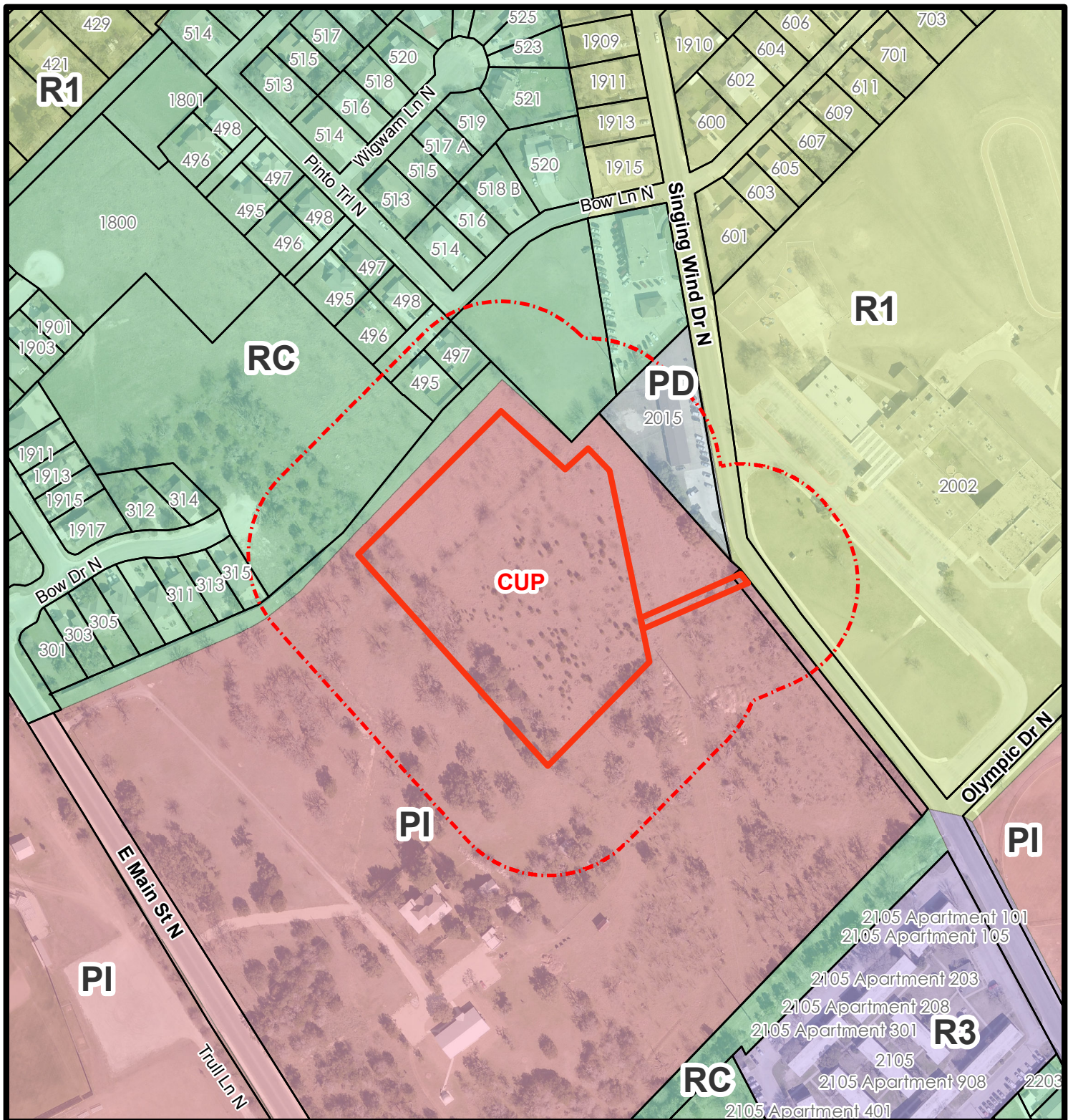
in Kerrville is a two-lane divided roadway with a center turn lane; however, in constrained areas, a two-lane undivided roadway may be appropriate so that a portion of the right-of-way could be used for pedestrian space or on-street parking.

Traffic Impact: Traffic to the site will be less than one trip per day on average for property maintenance.

Parking: No parking is required as no office or occupied structure is proposed to be built on the site.

Hold public hearing and approve Resolution No. 50-2018.



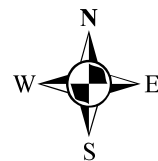
Location Map

2000 Block of Singing Wind

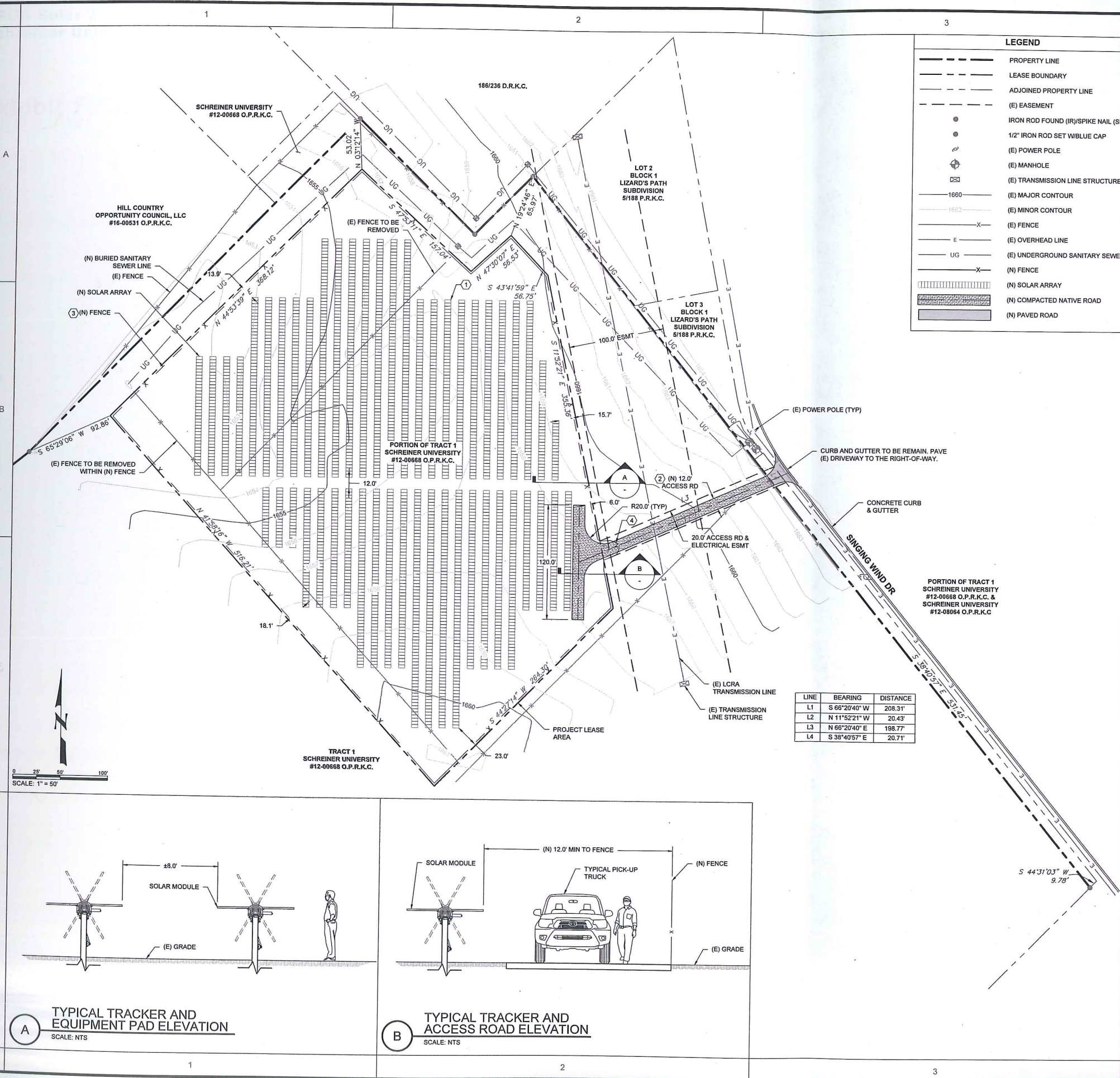

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

Phase 13 of Comanche Trace was annexed in 2017. Lots 1-6 were rezoned to Residential Cluster "RC" zoning district by Ordinance 2018-20 on September 25, 2018. The total acreage is approximately 0.8 acres. An approved Development Site Plan is required prior to the issuance of any building permits for property located in a "RC" district, other than a single family detached dwellings.

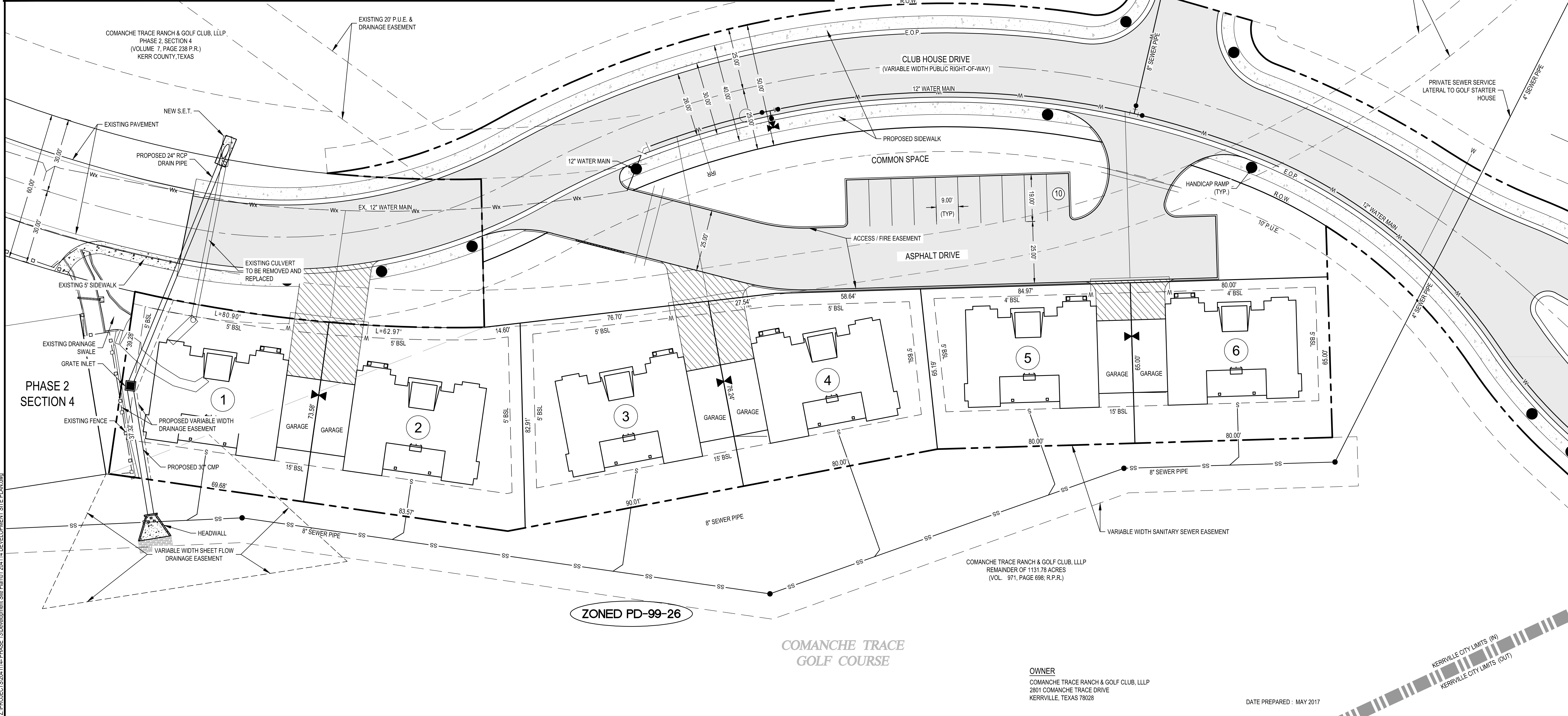
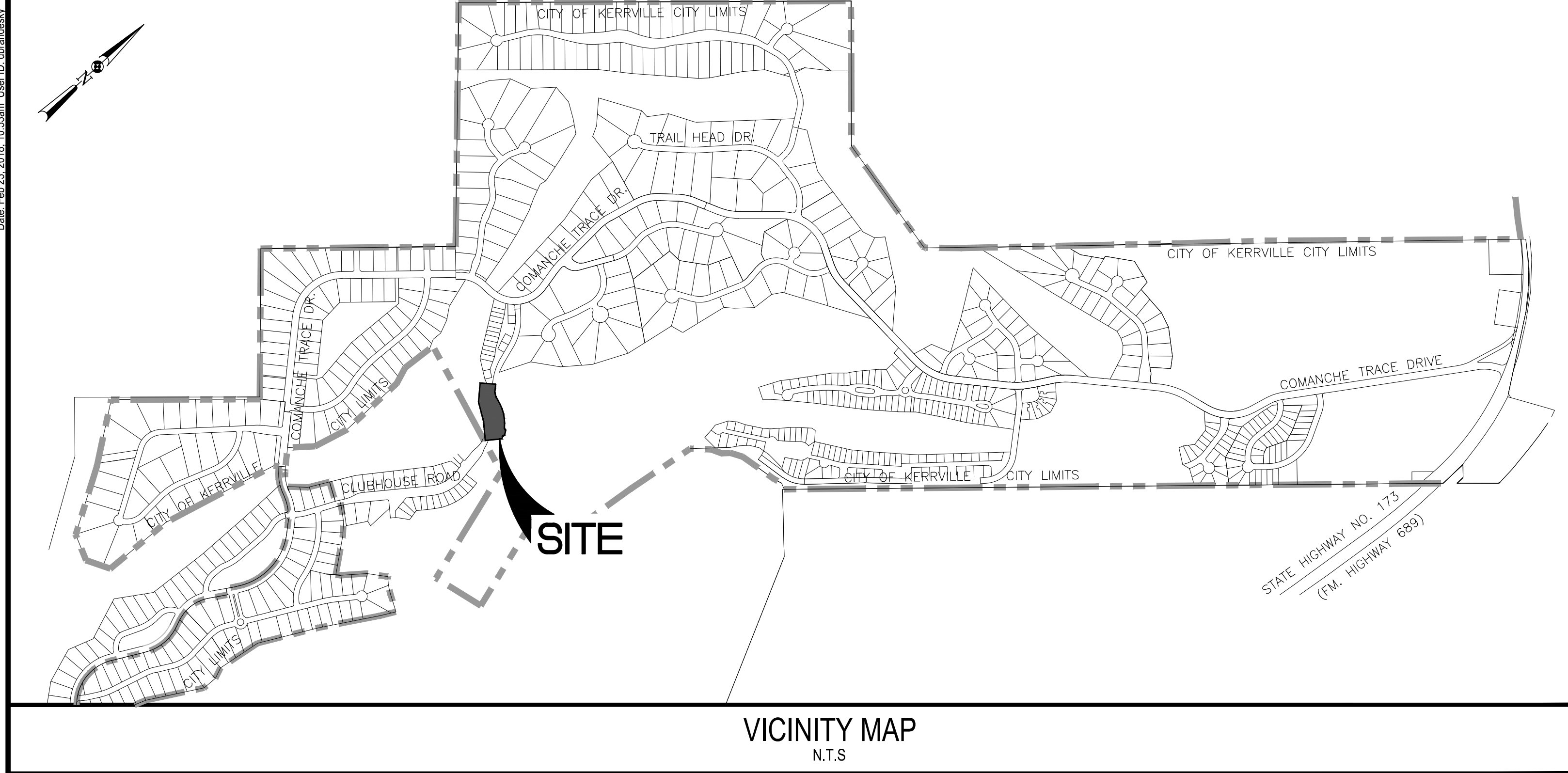
The request is consistent with the Kerrville 2050 Comprehensive Plan and is compatible with existing adjacent uses. Pedestrian and vehicle access is addressed through sidewalks, wheelchair ramps, and off-street parking which avoids unreasonable negative impact on adjacent properties. Two residential driveways are proposed to front on Clubhouse Drive. The remaining four driveways will front an access easement that includes ten additional parking spaces. The access easement is proposed to have two access points off of Clubhouse Drive. The access easement also provides for a twenty-five feet fire easement.

Storm water concerns are addressed through existing and proposed improvements as shown in the Development Site Plan. The building setbacks (4 feet in the front, 5 feet on the side, and 15 feet in the rear) and maximum building height (35 feet) are specified on the Development Site Plan.

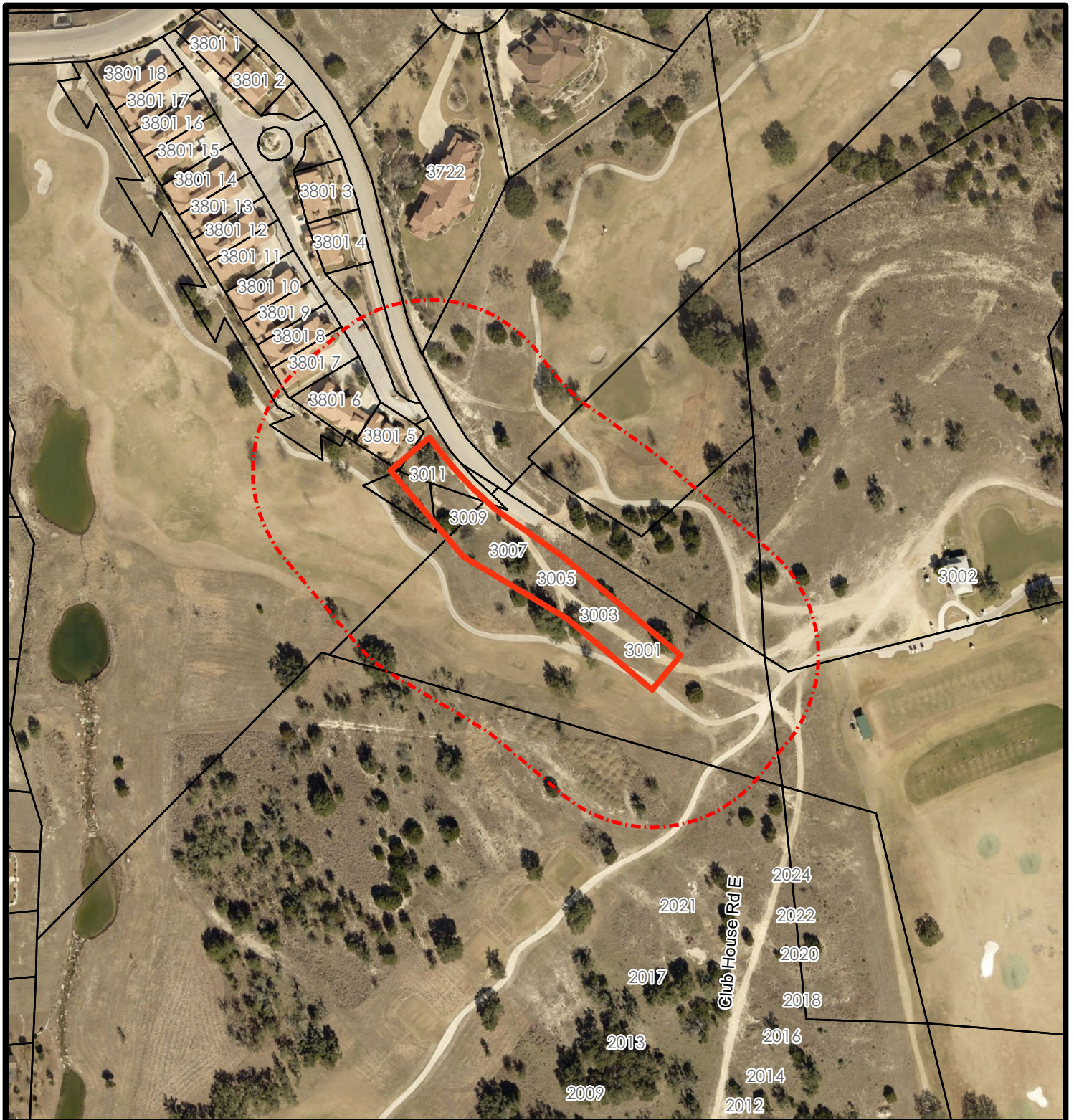

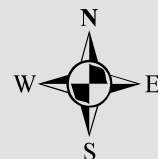

CITY COUNCIL CHARGE TO AND SCHEDULE FOR THE CHARTER REVIEW COMMISSION November 27, 2018

Introduction: The City Charter is a document prepared by the citizens of the City. The Charter provides direction to the City government on how to operate. The Charter needs periodic review to help ensure that it is current and that it properly reflects the overall directions of the community. Section 14.07 of the Charter requires that City Council initiate a review at least every five (5) years. As the Charter is the citizens' document, it is then a group of persons, made up of seven (7) Kerrville citizens that are tasked with reviewing it. It is the intent that this group represent all citizens of this community and that all citizens are invited to provide input into this process. Though appointed by City Council, the Charter Review Commission ultimately reports to the people of Kerrville.

Charge: City Council charges the Charter Review Commission as follows:

1. to organize itself as it sees fit, with a recommendation that it select a chair and a vice-chair. City staff will serve as secretary of the Commission and will, in part, take and prepare minutes.
2. to arrange its meeting schedule and location, with the fundamental goal that meeting times and locations be as accessible as possible to encourage public input.
3. to review the current City Charter pursuant to the following:
 - a. cause the Charter to conform to federal and state law where conflict or inconsistencies exist.
 - b. revise in an effort to clarify and condense as necessary or possible or where a section is confusing or believed to be ineffective.
 - c. consider the following provisions, as specifically provided for in Section 14.07 of the Charter:
 - i. Consider the operation of the City government under the Charter and determine whether any Charter sections require revision. To this end, at least one public hearing shall be held and the Commission shall have the power to compel the attendance of any officer or employee of the City and to require the submission of any

of the City records which it may deem necessary to the conduct of such hearing.

ii. Propose recommendations, if any, it deems desirable to ensure compliance with the Charter by the City government.

iii. Propose amendments, if any, to the Charter to improve the effective application of the Charter to current conditions and operations.

iv. Report its finding and present its proposed amendments, if any, to the City Council.

d. consider all other provisions of the Charter as the Charter Review Commission may determine is necessary.

4. to work as diligently as possible, with the understanding that pursuant to Section 14.07 of the Charter, the term of the Commission is set at six (6) months. However, this section also provides that Council may extend this term.
5. while acknowledging the six (6) month term, to have the goal of preparing recommendations in the form of amendments to the Charter for placement on the November 5, 2019, general election ballot.
6. to ensure placement on the November 5, 2019, ballot, the report of recommended amendments should be submitted to the City Council for ordinance preparation by the August 13, 2019, Council meeting.

Council and Staff Support: The Charter Review Commission may call on City Council members and members of City staff for advice and expertise as it desires. The City Attorney shall provide legal services to the Commission. Once appointed, the Commission will operate independently from Council direction and input.

Subsequent Council Action: Following the Charter Review Commission's submission of any recommended Charter amendments to the City Council, Council will consider such amendments and will vote to consider which amendments or any others are placed on the ballot for consideration by the electorate. The deadline for placement on the November 5, 2019, election ballot is September 10, 2019.

Members of the Charter Review Commission: The City Council, at a meeting to be held on December 11, 2018, shall appoint seven persons to the Charter Review Commission by majority vote.

The Charter Review Commission is so charged.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

General Fund

Year to date through October 31, 2018, the General Fund has recorded revenue of \$1.7 million compared to expense of \$2.0 million. Due to the seasonal nature of property tax payments, it is normal to have a deficit at this time of year. Items to note for October include:

1. Property tax is up significantly compared to FY2018 because property tax bills were mailed out by Kerr County approximately two weeks earlier than FY2018. The bills were mailed later in FY2018 due to a server issue at the County.
2. Sales tax is up 2.6% compared to October 2017. This is in line with our 2.2% budgeted increase. Sales tax already received in November is down 0.5% compared to FY2018 due to declines in our largest categories of retail trade and food services. We are continuing to monitor sales tax closely for any trends.
3. Other revenue is better than budget and FY2018 primarily due to strong EMS billing performance in October 2018.

Water Fund

Year to date through October 31, 2018, the Water Fund received revenues of \$927 thousand compared to expenditures of \$958 thousand. Notable activity includes:

1. Water sales are lower than budget and FY2018 due to record rainfall amounts in October 2018.
2. Water expenditures are lower than FY2018 because \$272K was transferred to the Capital Projects Fund for the Legion Lift Station project in October 2017. This transfer did not recur in FY2019.

Golf Fund

Year to date through October 31, 2018, the Golf Fund received revenues of \$57 thousand compared to expenditures of \$69 thousand. FY2019 revenue is lower than budget and FY2018 due to record rainfall in October.

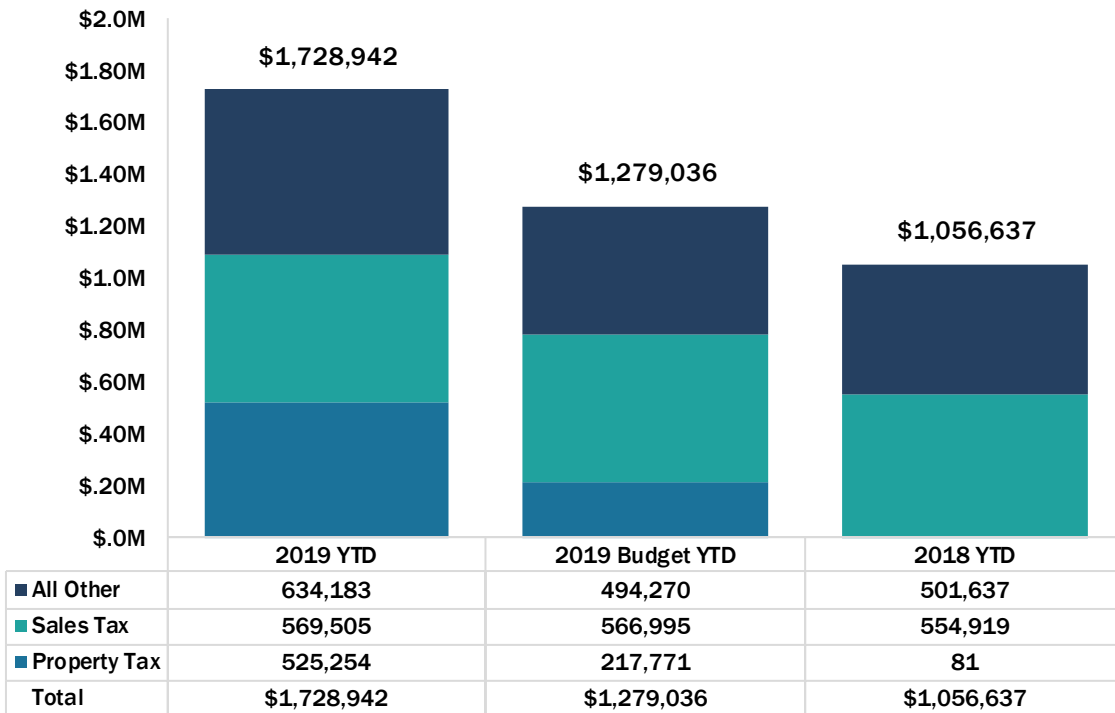

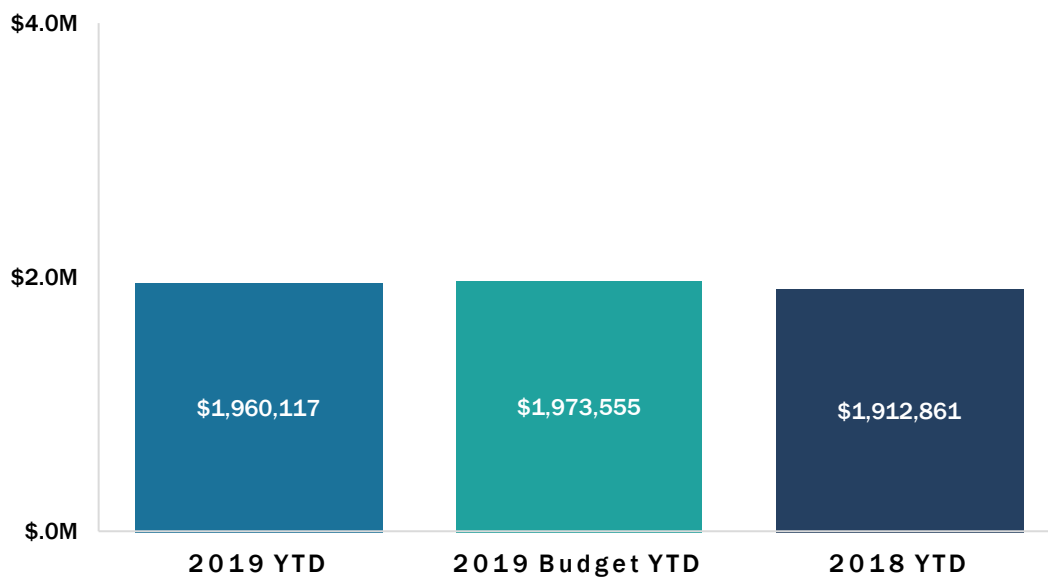

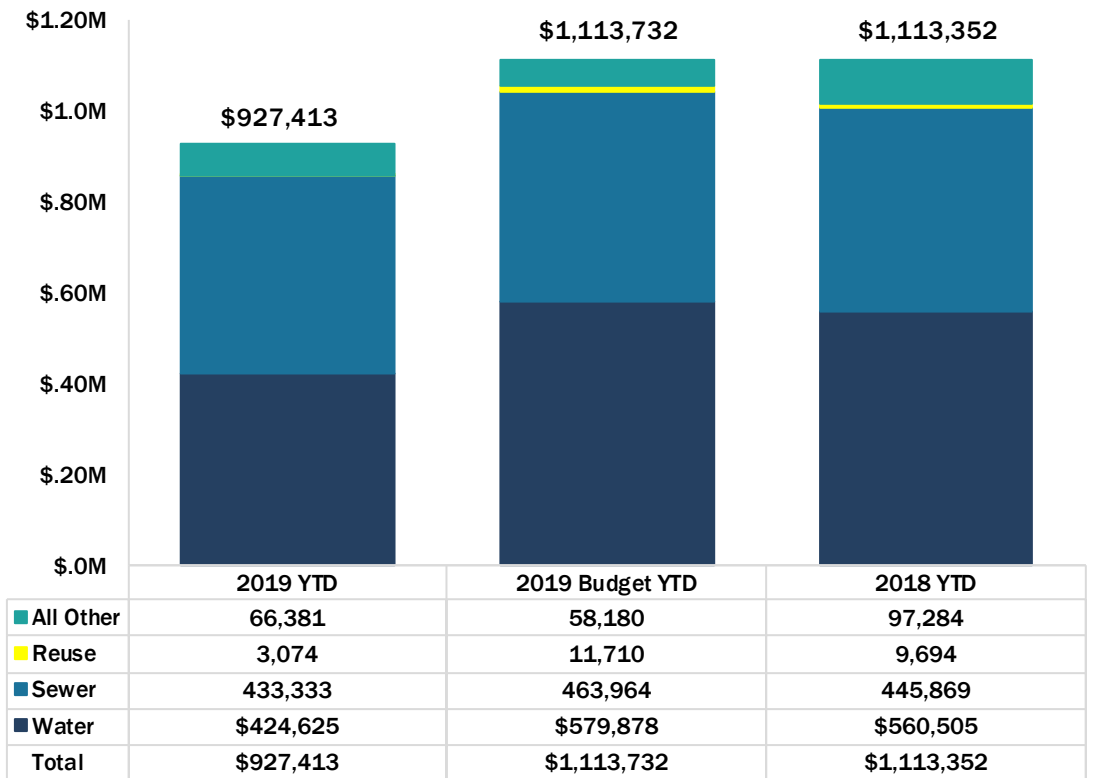
General Fund Revenues



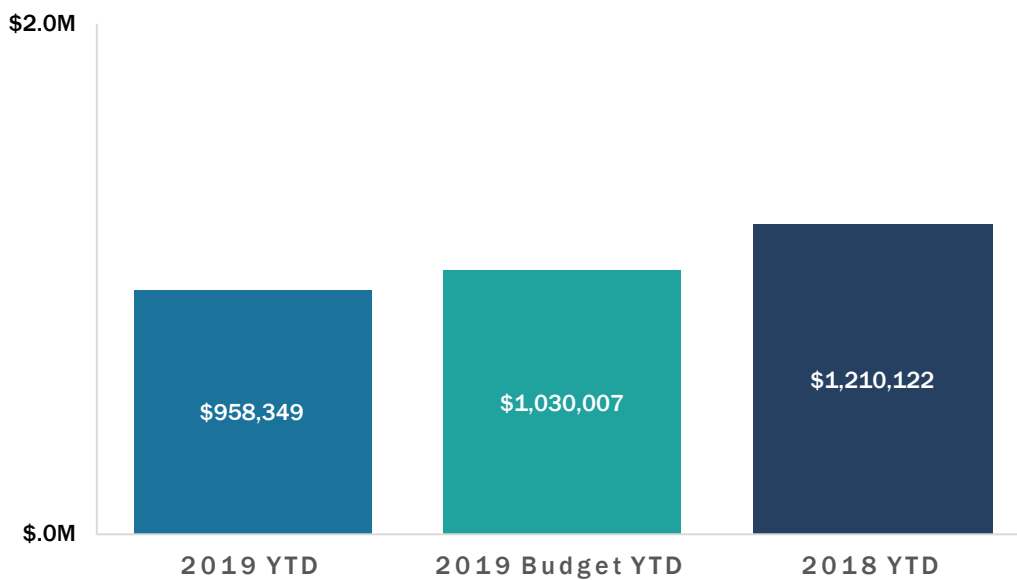
General Fund Expenditures

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

The City has received numerous complaints about the Council Chambers audio system. To correct and improve the overall audio system, the Information Technology Department will be implementing equipment upgrades and adding additional acoustic devices. These upgrades will be funded from the City's PEG Fund, and implemented during the week of December 17 to 21, 2018.

Granicus offers a service called Recurring Captioning. Captioning is performed in real-time with accuracy, punctuation, and spelling reflected as such with 98% accuracy and 180 WPM. The Recurring Captioning system is integrated with our current system which allows all videos to be fully searchable, indexed to agenda and minutes, and cross-linked to supporting materials, providing citizens with a completely integrated public record. The use of the Recurring Captioning will engage new audiences and support compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (when viewing online only), and offer greater accessibility to meetings with closed captioning. The captions are synchronized to meeting webcasts, and are recorded in real-time. This services gives the citizen greater accessibility and allows them to search videos for any word spoken during the meeting. Costs for the service are \$125 per hour with a 1 hour minimum. Staff is estimating annually 60 hours of meeting time at a cost of \$7,500. Any additional captioning beyond the 60 hours will be charged at a rate of \$150 per hour in half-hour increments.

Purpose:	The purpose of the Coalition is to enhance the opportunities for the recovery community to become fully integrated into the fabric of Kerrville. The Coalition shall work toward considering and identifying strategies and techniques for reducing barriers for the recovery community to be fully integrated into the local community as well as to identify and advocate goals and ideas for enhancing positive relationships by and amongst the recovery community.		
Qualifications:	At least one member from each of the following, but any of which may include more than one member: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) owner of a male boarding home facility with a valid permit issued by the City; (2) owner of a female boarding home facility with a valid permit issued by the City; (3) member of the recovering community; (4) citizen of Kerrville with interest in these issues; (5) representative of mental health support organizations such as Kerrville State Hospital; (6) representative of Peterson Health; (7) representative of Hill Country MHDD Centers; (8) representative from a residential addiction treatment facility located within Kerr County. 		
Powers and Duties:	On an annual basis, or more frequently as deemed proper by the Coalition or City Council, the Coalition should attend and report its conclusions, achievements, ideas, desires, and plans to the City Council. It is recommended that the initial issue with which the Coalition is charged to review is Ordinance No. 2013-06 (Chapter 30, Article I, Code of Ordinances), which addresses the operation of group homes and boarding home facilities operating within the City.		
Term of Office:	Each member shall be subject to two-year terms; provided, however, that at the Coalition's organizational meeting, the members shall draw lots to establish the duration of the initial terms, with an exact majority of the members serving an initial term of two years and the remaining members serving a one-year term. The expiration date of all terms shall be December 31 of the year corresponding with the results of the drawing of lots.		
Quorum:	Seven members		
Number of Members:	Thirteen		
Absences:	Any member who misses 25% of the regular meetings or three consecutive regular meetings may be replaced by City Council.		
Meeting Time & Place:	Meetings are to be held every other Monday at 4:00 p.m., but at least once each calendar quarter in the upstairs conference room at City Hall.
