Public Safety Facility Bond Committee General Discussion

General Discussion Topic #1 - Committee to discuss and agree upon the Deliverable, Givens, Resources and Process Sequence. Below is a strawman proposal to start the discussion. With agreement on questions and sequence, resources needed to answer the questions will be identified.

Deliverables:

1. By 1/15/2022 recommend to City Council whether there should be a bond election to meet the needs of a Public Safety Facility.
2. If a bond election is recommended, then the size of the bond should be included.

Givens:

1. The Public Safety Facility will “accommodate and serve City’s Police and Fire/EMS Departments, emergency management operations, and its Municipal Court.”
2. “Recommendations should reflect a City-wide community perspective.”
3. Charter does not speak to location or property acquisition. These questions are not within the committee charter.

Resources:

City Staff (including Fire/EMS, Police, Municipal Court, and Finance department personnel)
Randall Scott Architects

Proposed Process and Sequence:

Does answering these questions in this sequence lead to the deliverables?

1. Is an upgraded/new building with more space for the Police Department needed?
2. Is there a need to relocate the Fire Department Administrative offices?
3. Is an upgraded/new building needed for Municipal Court operations?
4. Is there a need for an Emergency Management Operations Center?
5. For each of the above, if the answer is Yes, then how much space (square feet) is needed?
6. Are there operational and/or cost efficiencies to have some or all of these facilities on the same campus?

7. Does this answer prepare the City for future growth?
8. What is the estimated cost per square foot for the following alternatives:
 - a. Greenfield site near downtown Kerrville?
 - b. Greenfield site within city limits but not near city center?
 - c. Remodel option (if possible) near downtown?
 - d. Remodel option (if possible) not near the city center?
9. Answers from above set the boundaries on the size of a proposed bond
10. What is the impact of the bond debt on city finances and property tax rates?
